Tavaine Salmon decided she wanted to work in the medical field after having negative experiences in health care settings. She wanted to provide better care for patients than she had received so she began researching schools that offered medical training. She found <u>New Community Career & Technical Institute (NCCTI)</u> and enrolled in its Patient Care Technician (PCT) program. She graduated from NCCTI in June and now spends her working hours greeting, registering and assisting patients at the Ferry Street location of <u>Newark Community</u> Health Centers Inc. as a Patient Service Representative (PSR).

The road to her health care career wasn't easy but with the assistance of NCCTI staff, Salmon was able to complete the program and find employment. Shortly after beginning the PCT program, she became sick and had to take a three-month leave

When she returned to class, PCT Instructor Dr. Ehab Salib monitored her progress, provided practice tests and coached her on what to study so that she would be able to pass the <u>National Healthcareer Association</u> exam. She passed the exam on her first attempt.

Salib praised Salmon for her hard work and dedication to the program.

"She was a very good student, coming in on time, never leaving early, studying hard, doing all her homework in due time, asking reasonable questions related to the subject and showing great interest," he said.

EXTENDED CARE HELPS HOMELESS PATIENT HEAL AND FIND HOUSING



Leonardo Ortiz was homeless and weak when he came to Extended Care. Now he is living in his own apartment.

hen Leonardo Ortiz arrived at New Community Extended Care Facility, he was homeless and had just been discharged from the hospital after having a toe amputated following an ulcer in his foot. After receiving care at the facility and coordination with his health insurance, Extended Care staff members were able to discharge him to a new home on Jan. 30.

Ortiz entered Extended Care in October 2022 after leaving Newark Beth Israel Medical Center. He was weak and unable to walk so he participated in physical therapy and received wound care for his foot until it healed completely. Staff members also helped him manage his diabetes.

He is grateful for the treatment he received at Extended Care.

"If it wasn't for coming here, I would be dead," he said.

In addition to treating his physical ailments, Extended Care personnel worked with Ortiz and his health insurance company to find him a permanent home. When he was hospitalized, Ortiz was living in a garage used to store his car. Now he lives in an apartment for low-income and disabled individuals in Newark.

Extended Care's Social Services Department contacted Ortiz's health insurance company and they were able to establish home health services for him, including a visiting nurse, and necessary equipment like a blood pressure machine and glucometer. The insurance company also provided furnishings for the apartment, including furniture, kitchen supplies and even clothing.

Licensed Practical Nurse Maria Cruz, who was one of the nurses to care for Ortiz, said she is very happy that Extended Care was able to help him find stable housing and ensure a safe transition upon discharge. Cruz encouraged Ortiz not to rush the discharge process but instead wait until he had everything he needed in the apartment to

set him up for success.

Ortiz's sister is involved in his care and will be helping him with medication administration and making sure he attends doctors' appointments. As a diabetic, he always needs to manage that condition.

Cruz said the visiting nurse will check his blood pressure and blood sugar levels, as well as make sure he is taking his prescribed medication. He will also have a home health aide who will help with meal prepping because Ortiz doesn't cook.

"We're trying to keep the system rolling so he can be safe," Cruz said.

Ortiz is happy to be in his own home. He recommends Extended Care to anyone in need of its services.

"It was very good and the staff was very nice," he said.

New Community Extended Care Facility is a skilled nursing facility located at 266 South Orange Ave., Newark. It offers long-term care, short-term care, subacute care and Alzheimer's and dementia care. For more information, visit newarknursinghome.org or call 973-624-2020.

SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS: GENERAL ENROLLMENT PERIOD FOR MEDICARE PART B

BY SOCIAL SECURITY ADMINISTRATION

f you did not apply for Medicare Part B (medical insurance) within three months before or after turning age 65, you have another chance each year during the General Enrollment Period. The period runs from Jan. 1 to March 31 every year.

If you didn't enroll in Part B when you were first eligible, you may have to pay a late enrollment penalty for as long as you have Part B coverage. Your monthly premium will increase 10 percent for each 12-month period that you were eligible for Part B but did not sign up for it. Your coverage starts the first day of the month after you sign up.



EMPLOYEE SPOTLIGHT: MIGUEL PACHECO



Miguel Pacheco joined New Community to lead New Community Career & Technical Institute in August.

Miguel Pacheco is a Harvard graduate with many years of experience in the workforce development space. But his journey hasn't been easy and it's one of the reasons he's passionate about working to help students improve their circumstances. He currently serves as the Director of <u>New</u> <u>Community Career & Technical Institute</u> (NCCTI), a role he started in August.

Pacheco was born in Peru and came to the United States as a child, settling in Brooklyn, N.Y. He dropped out of high school and was unsuccessful in passing the GED exam to earn a high school diploma. He landed a job working at a hospital in a union that provided a pathway to get a high school diploma called the National External Diploma Program. That program allows individuals to complete a portfolio of life skills and academic tasks to receive their diploma.

"Through that experience, I learned the importance of workforce programs and trades programs," Pacheco said. "Placing people in jobs and seeking short-term training so that you can work."

Pacheco attended a few colleges but did not complete a degree. While enrolled at Pace University, he got a temporary job in the mail room at a corporate company in New York City. At the end of three months, Pacheco was offered a full-time position in the company's IT department working on the help desk.

"I took the role without knowing how to type. I took the role without knowing what a hard drive is or what a monitor is or how to take a PC apart," Pacheco said. "By God's grace, I learned on the job."

After learning a variety of skills, Pacheco left that company and opened his own business in Brooklyn, teaching people what he had learned in the area of IT. His work got noticed and he was offered a job at Opportunities for a Better Tomorrow, a nonprofit organization with a mission to break the cycle of poverty and inequity through education, job training and employment. He worked at the nonprofit for about 10 years, beginning as an instructor and eventually becoming a director. The City University of New York (CUNY) approached the nonprofit to make the education credit-based. The plan was to make Pacheco an adjunct professor so he could continue teaching the courses.

"I interviewed for that role, ready to go and then they said we just need to know where your credentials are. And I didn't have them. So that was an eye-opener for me," Pacheco said.

He left that organization and got a job as Director of <u>CUNY TechWorks</u>, whose mission is to connect underrepresented and low-income New Yorkers to opportunities in New York City's tech sector via no-cost, applied skills education and training.

His boss there was a <u>Harvard University</u> graduate and he started watching the TV show Suits about lawyers who went to Harvard. One day he looked up the school and found out he could obtain a certification through the <u>Harvard Business</u> School. After some hesitation, he applied for the program and was accepted.

At the same time, his oldest son started attending <u>Middlesex College</u>. His wife encouraged him to take some courses, which he did. He decided to quit his job to focus on his education since he was earning his associate's degree at Middlesex College and taking the Harvard Business School certification course. During that time, he drove for Uber as a source of income.

Pacheco graduated from Middlesex College with his son and completed the Harvard certification course. He then learned that he could earn a bachelor's degree from Harvard University if he proved himself with two courses. He moved to Massachusetts, enrolled in Harvard and graduated with his bachelor's degree.

"It was a huge achievement," he said.

His educational journey is a big part of why he has chosen his line of work.

"To me, that's sort of my commitment. That may be why Harvard accepted me because with me it was always about if I'm going to get this, I want to go back to my community and I want to change it. So that's what I'm doing," he said.

Pacheco's favorite part of his job is helping people succeed.

"Seeing people's lives changing is rewarding," he said. "Whether it be passing an exam or getting a job. Just celebrating with them. These little stepping stones of success are also our success here."

New Community Director of Mission Frances Teabout is excited to have Pacheco on the NCCTI team.

"Miguel is a great addition to the NCC family. He brings a wealth of experience and knowledge that will strengthen our current services and expand our program offerings," she said. "He is forward thinking with experience in technical career training."

SENIOR SPOTLIGHT: ROBERT JONES

Robert Jones was happy to move into New Community Associates three years ago. At the time, he had been living with his sister for about six months and wanted a place of his own to call home.

"I do it for me. I don't do it for an award or something like that," he said. "You have to give back. That's how I look at it."

Jones worked as a mover for Allied Van Lines for 25 years. He did both moving and driving for the company and had the opportunity to travel for the job.



Jones was born and raised in Newark so he was familiar with New Community. He submitted applications for Associates, 180 South Orange Ave., Newark, and Manor Senior, 545 Orange St., Newark. He heard back from Associates first and jumped at the chance to move in.

Since then, Jones has become involved in helping with building activities. Associates Resident Services Coordinator Anne Moran appreciates his assistance.

"Mr. Jones helps out with a lot of activities I have and with the food that we get at the building," she said. "He delivers food boxes to the residents that are unable to come down to pick the boxes up."

Jones enjoys volunteering to help his neighbors and doesn't look for recognition.

"I called it my vacation," he said.

Now he helps move tables and chairs in the Community Room to set up and break down events for the building.

His favorite part about living at Associates is the people. He also likes having his own space. Before living with his sister, Jones rented a room in a house so having his own bathroom and living room has been enjoyable.

In his free time, Jones enjoys fishing at Branch Brook Park. He typically throws back his catches, but he has brought back some fish at the request of a neighbor.

In addition to his sister who lives in Newark,

Robert Jones has lived at New Community Associates for three years.

Jones has two children. One lives on Long Island and the other lives in Georgia.

At 66, Jones is enjoying life in his apartment.

"I've got a nice view," he said. "I'm on the 13th floor."

She believed it would be a good fit for her professionally.

everyone she encounters.

"It makes a difference the way you treat them, the way you talk to them. Because sometimes they're so mad at you and then at the end of the appointment, they come to the front and they say, 'Thank you so much,'" she said. "That's something that stays with me."

success.

"Our goal is to help all of our students succeed in their area of study and find employment. I'm happy to say we met both of those goals with Ms. Salmon."

Salmon interviewed for roles in hospitals as well but ultimately decided to work in a medical office setting so she wouldn't be away from her children for 12 hours at a time. She lives in Maplewood with her husband and three children, ages 11, 7 and 3.

"I love the fact that they're geared towards helping people and making people feel better," she said. "And they accommodate everybody."

Salmon applied for the job and after a phone interview and in-person interview was offered the role. She registers patients, makes appointments and checks their insurance. If a patient is without health insurance, she can help set them up through <u>Get Covered New Jersey</u> and Medicaid. Since starting the job in September, Salmon has earned two certifications that allow her to complete health care applications for patients.

Sometimes patients come in frustrated or upset but Salmon always makes a point to be respectful and do what she can to assist Salmon said she loves her job and is grateful she found NCCTI.

"The school is amazing," she said. "I would recommend it every day."

In addition to providing the necessary education, NCCTI has relationships with employers and brings representatives to the school to meet with students, answer questions and conduct mock interviews.
